HEAD
 5 out of every 6 workers who sustain a head injury aren't wearing a hard hat at the time.

EYES & EARS
 The average construction worker spends 1/3 of each shift exposed to noises that are **85+ decibels**.
 40% of workers suffering an eye injury actually are wearing some sort of protection at the time, but full-cup and side shield features are often absent.
 Chronic risks such as noise exposure must be addressed with the same diligence as traumatic injuries caused by flying objects.

HANDS
 Considering construction workers make a living with their hands, it's no surprise that **injuries to this area are the 2nd-leading cause of days-away-from-work**.
 Gloves provide the first line of defense against cuts and abrasions, but don't forget about chemical and heat protection as well when making your selection.

CLOTHING
 1/8 of all street and highway construction injuries are visibility-related.
 High-visibility clothing ensures that you'll be seen by everyone in the construction zone and safe to do your job.
